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the **GEMINI** project

summary

In line with the <u>EU Gender Equality Strategy 2020-2025</u> and from an intersectional perspective, the research-action project **GEMINI-Gender Equality through Media Investigation and New training Insights** aims to tackle gender-based stereotypes that create gender inequalities and empower young adults to create products that convey positive messages of gender equality.

Focusing on the representation of gender-related issues in serial dramas and how they can contribute to gender equality, the **GEMINI** project addresses European high school students and teachers/trainers in **four European Countries** (Denmark, Ireland, Italy and Romania) characterized by different socio-cultural contexts and varying levels of gender equality, as measured by the Gender Equality Index (GEI).

The choice to focus on screen serialities is due to the acknowledgement that serial dramas are significant cultural products that not only reflect but actively shape societal norms and values. As such, they are powerful instruments for raising awareness of critical relevant social issues, including gender-related ones, employing narratives centred both on the storytelling of traditional gender stereotypes and the representation of more gender-inclusive models.

Therefore, the **GEMINI** project aims to reach the following goals through a varied set of activities:

- Investigating the production and narrative strategies underlying the representation of gender identities in serial dramas and how such representation affects the promotion of gender equality among the target groups through in-depth interviews with key informants, textual/production analysis, and media content/sentiment analysis on a selected corpus of serial dramas.
- Understanding the target groups' awareness about gender equality and how they perceive the representation of gender identities in

- serial narratives through focus groups, multi-language surveys, semistructured interviews.
- Enhancing analytical, relational and communication skills on gender equality practices and models through the development of the educational toolkit.
- Spreading a gender equality-oriented culture through self-produced communication initiatives, such as audiovisual products and the screenwriting contest.
- Providing guidelines and policy recommendations on how to communicate gender equality addressed to EU and national institutions as well as broadcasters and streaming platforms.
- Exploiting the project results and disseminating them among the target groups and the general public through the website, communication activities, academic and promotional events, and scholarly publications.

The **GEMINI** project is **co-funded by the European Union** within the framework of the <u>Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values Programme</u> (CERV-2002-GE).

The project, led by <u>Link Campus University</u>, involves academic partners (Aalborg University, <u>University of Bucharest</u>, <u>National University of Ireland Maynooth</u>, <u>University of Algarve</u>) and <u>organizations/associations/institutions</u> working in the field of education (<u>Fondazione Hallgarten-Franchetti - Centro Studi Villa Montesca</u>, <u>Center for Educational Initiatives</u>, <u>Capacity Ireland</u>, the <u>Maltese Ministry of Education</u>, <u>Research</u>, <u>Innovation</u>, <u>Youth and Sport</u>).

MARICA SPALLETTA (Ph.D.) is an associate professor in Sociology of Culture and Communication at the Link Campus University of Rome, where she is scientific manager of Link LAB (Social Research Centre), and member of the Academic Board of the Ph.D. program in "Human Sciences for Innovation, Inclusion & Sustainability".

Her research focuses on mediatization of cultural products and the agenda processes; the media

representation of social issues and the audiences' perspective; the credibility issue. Over the last twenty years, she has participated and directed several research projects focused on these topics, funded and/or promoted by universities, associations, organizations and institutions (among which: the H2020 research project DETECt-Detecting Transcultural Identity in European Popular Crime Narratives and the national interest research project Media and Terrorism. The impact of communication and digital networks on the perceived insecurity). Currently, she is serving as principal investigator for the EU research-action project GEMINI-Gender Equality through Media Investigation and New training Insights (CERV-2022-GE).

She has authored and/or co-authored about 100 scientific publications, hosted by international and national top-level journals (such as: *Celebrity Studies, European Journal of Communication, Catalan Journal of Communication and Cultural Studies, Mediascapes Journal, Comunicazioni sociali, Comunicazione Politica, Problemi dell'informazione*) and leading publishers (Edinburgh University Press, SAGE, IGI Global, Meltemi, Mimesis, Rubbettino, FrancoAngeli).

about the conference

aims & topics

In the contemporary media landscape, marked by the increasingly pervasive presence of global digital platforms, serial dramas have emerged as dominant forms of entertainment, capable of captivating wide and heterogeneous audiences, with young adults playing a prominent role. Therefore, the primary aim of the GEMINI-SCAPES conference is to explore how young audiences engage with gender-related issues as portrayed in serial dramas.

Functioning as both mirrors and shapers of people's daily lives, serial narratives serve as significant cultural texts that not only reflect but actively shape societal norms and values. As such, they are powerful instruments for raising awareness of critical relevant social issues, both those already well-recognized and those still emerging. Given their role as meaningful discourses requiring active interpretation, these narratives affect young viewers who negotiate gender representations and messages through individual and socio-cultural lenses.

The key role of serial dramas as tools for raising awareness is also confirmed by the increasing attention the European Union has given to these cultural products in recent years. Through initiatives such as the <u>Citizens</u>, <u>Equality</u>, <u>Rights and Values Programme</u> (CERV), the EU has employed <u>audiovisual media</u> to <u>challenge stereotypes</u> and <u>shift people's attitudes</u> toward gender-related issues. This approach is also particularly notable in relation to the <u>EU's gender mainstreaming</u> policy goals: the <u>EU Gender Equality Strategy 2020-2025</u> clearly emphasises the transformative role of audiovisual media in fostering an inclusive European society, promoting diversity as both a core value and a driver of growth and innovation in all areas of life.

Over the last decade, serial dramas have increasingly focused on representing gender-related issues, blending identity topics (such as **gender identity** and **sexual orientation**) with broad social concerns (like **gender equality**, **gender pay gap**, and **gender-based violence**).

In this context, an intersectional approach has emerged as a key framework for framing and analysing gender issues, incorporating how different aspects of a person's identity other than gender (such as race, class, disability, etc.) interact and contribute to unique experiences of discrimination and inequality, or privilege. To do this, serial dramas have employed narratives centred both on the storytelling of traditional gender stereotypes and the representation of more gender-inclusive models, especially with the aim of reaching heterogeneous audiences.

From the audience perspective, these narratives have a particularly strong impact on young adults, whose reception of gender-related messages is shaped by the emergence of more inclusive approaches. Younger generations, in turn, may be influenced also by serial narratives and their characters, who serve as aspirational role models in terms of appearance, confidence, and power.

Therefore, examining the interplay between serial dramas, gender-related issues and young audiences opens up a rich field of inquiry that is both timely and necessary. The GEMINI-SCAPES conference aims to explore this multifaceted relationship, bringing together scholars from various disciplines (cultural studies, media studies, television studies, screen studies, gender studies, industry and production studies, audience studies, celebrity studies, and media literacy) and different socio-cultural contexts.

DANIELLE HIPKINS is a professor of Italian Studies and Film at the University of Exeter.

She has written widely on gender representation in postwar Italian cinema, and published *Italy's Other Women: Gender and Prostitution in Postwar Italian Cinema*, 1940-1965 (Peter Lang, 2016). She was also co-editor of *Prostitution and Sex Work in Global Cinema* (Palgrave, 2017) with Kate Taylor-Jones. With Daniela Treveri Gennari, Catherine O'Rawe, Silvia Dibeltulo and Sarah Culhane she co-authored *Italian Cinema Audiences: Histories and Memories of Cinema-going in Post-war Italy* (Bloomsbury, 2020).

She recently led the AHRC-funded project *A Girls' Eye-view: Girlhood on the Italian Screen Since the 1950s (2021-2024)* together with Romana Andò (Sapienza University of Rome).



FRANCESCA COMUNELLO is a full professor in the Department of Communication and Social Research, Sapienza University of Rome, where she teaches *Internet and Social Media Studies*, and Public Sector Communication.

Her research and publications focus on the intersections between digital technology and society, including digitally mediated social relations, ageing and digital communication, gender and digital platforms, digital media and disaster communication.

She is involved in several research projects and research networks, at an international level, and is experienced in working in multidisciplinary teams, with a focus on emergency and science communication.

Her work has been published in Journals like New Media and Society, Information Communication and Society, Media Culture and Society, The Sociological Review, The Communication Review, Ageing and Society, American Behavioural Scientist, and Violence Against Women, among others.

Her most recent book (with Simone Mulargia) is Social Media in Earthquake-Related Communication (Emerald, 2018).

LUCA BARRA is a full professor at the University of Bologna, where he teaches *Television and Media Studies*. His research focuses on television production and distribution cultures, comedy and humour TV genres, the international circulation of media products (and their national mediations), the history of Italian television, and the evolution of the contemporary media landscape. He is vice-chair of the ECREA Television Studies section, and member of the NECS steering committee. He is one of the editors-in-chief of *VIEW. PIA MAJBRITT JENSEN is an associate professor at the Department of Media Studies and Journalism at Aarhus University, Denmark. An audience, industry, and production scholar, current research includes an Independent Research Fund Denmark project on the production and reception of audiovisual fiction for children. She has published widely and co-edited New Patterns in Global TV Formats (2016), The Global Audiences of Danish TV Drama (2020), Danish TV Drama: Global Lessons from a Small Nation (2020), and Audiovisual Content for Children and Adolescents in Scandinavia (2023).



NICOLETTA MARINI-MAIO is a professor of Italian and Film Studies, and John J. and Ann Conser Curley Chair in Global Education at Dickinson College, USA. Her research centres on the intersections between media, politics, cultural studies, gender studies, and feminist and postfeminist theories. With Ellen Nerenberg, she is co-author of La nazione Winx: Educare la futura consumista (Rubbettino, forthcoming). Her publications include A Very Seductive Body Politics: Silvio Berlusconi in Cinema (Mimesis); articles and book chapters on the representation of the years of lead in Italian film and theatre, comingof-age in Italian film, auteur cinema, acting, and the Decamerotici; and pedagogical volumes on teaching foreign languages and culture through theatre and performance. She is founder of gender/sexuality/italy, an academic journal on politics of gender and sexuality in Italian culture. She is Vice President of the American Association for Italian Studies (AAIS).



ANNA LISA TOTA is Vice-Rector of the Roma Tre University, delegate for the coordination of Third Mission activities, full professor in Sociology of Culture and Communication at the Department FILCOSPE where she teaches Art Sociology, Communication Sociology and Music Sociology. Past President (2014-2017) of the Section "Processes and Cultural Institutions" of the Italian Association of Sociology (AIS). Past Chair of the Research Network "Sociology of culture" (2009-2011) and the Research Network "Sociology of the Arts" (20021-2003) of the European Sociological Association (ESA). From 1999 to 2001 she was Chairman of the Ministerial Committee "Gender, generation, cultural differences" established by the Equal Opportunities Minister Laura Balbo. She has done extensively research on public memories of the victims of the Italian terrorist attacks, on memory studies, museums, music, arts and gender studies.
